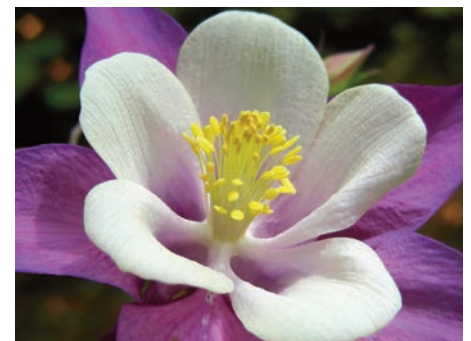

Right Activity

Who serve in the Activities Department are so very grateful for the continual unfoldment of right activity at Wide Horizon. The Activities staff currently consists of Mike Gutesha, who works fulltime, and Jan Dillingham and Judy Fryberger, who work part time. Having two people available most days has allowed us to expand our activities program in many ways. In addition, there are several dedicated volunteers who serve on Saturdays – four of whom come from Colorado Springs! We sincerely appreciate all of our volunteers as well as the dedicated staff.

During the past year, as the United States Presidential Election was underway, we initiated a group discussion activity with Wide Horizon's residents, which met every three weeks to review how we, individually and collectively, can "support a righteous government." This was inspired by Mary Baker Eddy's response to the question, "What are your politics?" She answered, "I have none, in reality, other than to help support a righteous government; to love God supremely, and my neighbor as myself." (*First Church of Christ, Scientist and Miscellany*, p. 276) We did not discuss politics, political parties, or candidates, but rather turned to readings from The Holy Bible and *Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures* by Mrs. Eddy. There was opportunity for those wishing to share metaphysical inspiration and/or brief readings from

past and current periodicals. A renewal of these discussions will resume into 2017.

We try to maintain a balance of activities which include metaphysical and recreational reading; individual visits with guests; musical programs; outdoor walks on the grounds at Wide Horizon and in the surrounding neighborhood; holiday events and outdoor picnics. We are so grateful for the spacious grounds at Wide – offering beautiful vistas of the mountains and the wildlife that takes advantage of the beautiful space we have here. There is such deep appreciation by all for the location of Wide Horizon for its beauty and inspiration.

One of our most appreciated activities is the Thursday evening testimony meetings, where our guests are able to share inspiration, gratitude, and of course, demonstrations of healing. We are so grateful for the volunteers that prepare readings for these Thursday Evening Testimony Meetings. We welcome those who have served in branch churches as readers to help support this healing activity. If interested, we would love for you to be included as one of our readers. We try to keep enough volunteers on a list so that no one serves more than once per quarter. Our scheduler for readers is also a volunteer.

We feel so much gratitude for all of our devoted volunteers who contribute to the activities for our guests at Wide Horizon. One volunteer reads

recreational books to groups, and another volunteer reads metaphysical articles to an individual guest. There are volunteers who assist in activities (lovingly titled "TLC Givers"); individuals who help us decorate for Christmas and then "un-decorate" after the New Year; musicians who play the piano or other instruments for us (a young pianist and a young violinist play for us when they've been able to work it into their school schedules); some folks share videos of vacations they've taken; a volunteer records articles and poems from *The Christian Science Journal* for us. For several years a group of ladies from a Denver area branch church visits in December, sharing Christmas stories and poems and "goodies," and singing Christmas carols. This is such a joyous and fun activity, filled with love.

Furthermore, in addition to their other responsibilities, for years our volunteer Board of Directors has continually encouraged us and prayerfully supported all activity at Wide Horizon. Last, but definitely not least, we have Christian Science practitioners who willingly pray (as house practitioners) to support Wide Horizon and Christian Science nursing, usually for one or two weeks. This support helps us to maintain an atmosphere of Love conducive to healing.

On the Nursing Path

When we sign on to become Christian Science Nurses, we know there may be times we can be faced with really yucky jobs – we just hope, not too often! Our realm of clean-up at a facility, be it dressings trays, laundry, the kitchen, tidying up or emptying the nurses' station trash, is routine and defined. Likewise in the home on a private duty, while each situation is unique, the parameters regarding how much housekeeping must be done are likewise defined. These responsibilities are a small part of our nursing, but the patient is always our primary focus of care and God should be the focus of our thought.

[Last year] I was called upon to s-t-r-e-t-c-h my concept of nursing, my focus of care.

On a private duty case, I had a chore that CS nurses aren't frequently called on to do – haul a large accumulation of recyclables to the recycle center. The handyman who usually took care of this had been called away to help his dad. The stuff was really mounting up! So I filled the car with ten 20-gallon bags of metals, paper, cardboard, plastics and glass. Then I headed to the recycle center.

When I got there, I found it wasn't a drop-the-stuff-off-in-the-bags kind of center; it was a sort-it-yourself recycling center. I had to go through each bag, look at the bottom of each piece of plastic before tossing it into #1, #2, #3 or "Other" bins, and then sort the steel cans from the aluminum

beverage cans, and then heave what seemed like tons of "The Wall Street Journal" into already overflowing paper bins.

It was a hot Arizona day under full sun, and a slow, menial, disheartening job. Imperceptibly, I slid into discouragement. I had turned aside from my college education to pursue Christian Science nursing. What would my father think, as tolerant as he was, if he could see where it had brought me? What was I doing with my life?!!! Was this Christian Science nursing?!!! Really?!!!



I sighed, and kept sorting. And metaphysically, pushed back! For me, becoming a Christian Science Nurse had always been about being of service to my fellow man, about having the humility, the grace, the Love, to do so and, to go forward. Divine Mind always had me in my right place! This

was a strange one – but, here I was. So, trust, and keep sorting!

The last large open bin I had to toss into was for glass – all shapes and uses for glass conceivable. I noticed an amber colored, sort of vintage bottle. It looked vaguely interesting, so I plucked it out and took it with me.

A couple of days later I googled the words, Empire Glass Works. It was embossed on one side of the bottle around a central design of a cluster of grapes. On the other side, the design was an American eagle and 13 stars. Empire had manufactured flasks and bottles, said e-Bay. The first Empire bottle that came up was like mine but with a different pattern of stars for \$24.95. Then, there was my bottle, with 13 stars – for \$99.99!

The physical object, the monetary value, has no significance. The message does. God, Divine Mind wanted me to remember, be reassured, that right efforts do not go unnoticed. My recycled "reward" reminds me of this every day. So have no fear, dear Nurses, God is here! And with us the Christ, on our path, always!

As a side note, I sincerely appreciate the nurturing, loving, high quality of care and spiritual environment Wide Horizon provides. I was so fortunate to spend five months of 2016 in this atmosphere. When there are challenges in my experience, Wide Horizon has become part of my framework for strength and comfort. Thank you!

- ◆ A guest told of the last few months being faced sometimes of waking up in the night feeling pain and confusion. Each time this has happened, she has been very aware of how grateful for the loving support and atmosphere that she feels at Wide Horizon. She and others expressed gratitude for the atmosphere here and how helpful it is to their spiritual progress.
- ◆ Thank you for my stay at Horizon House. Wide Horizon is a very lovely place to be in winter. Wishing you joy as you welcome Christmas into your hearts and homes.

- ◆ Wide Horizon is a great organization with excellent leadership and a mission that meets the needs of a broad community.

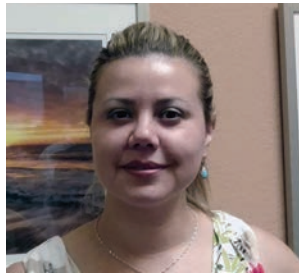
Excerpt from the *Christian Science Sentinel*, December 16, 1916
