that Wide Horizon has experienced the safety concerning Covid-19 as promised in Psalm 91, "I will say of the Lord, He is my refuge and my fortress: my God; in Him will I trust. ... There shall no evil befall thee; neither any plague come nigh thy dwelling." We are so grateful there have been no cases of the virus here.

Both health and spirits are good among the staff and guests at Wide Horizon. We continue to provide the same high-quality, prayer-based Christian Science nursing as before the pandemic.

Though we are compliant with federal, state, and county guidelines and regulations regarding prevention of the virus, we are not giving our consent to the beliefs they address. As required, we have taken such measures as wearing face masks, social distancing, and daily testing of temperatures for all working here; but we know our primary protection comes from being "hid with Christ in God."

Since our last update in March, we are now allowing pre-arranged family and Christian Science practitioner visits which occur outdoors. And, we are very selectively accepting admissions for Christian Science nursing as well as rest and study. However, we continue to not host any events here or facilitate outside activities such as church-going for the foreseeable future. On the other hand, we continue to have wonderful volunteers who provide weekly readings for our Thursday evening testimony meetings which are read by staff members and broadcast to the rooms. And, we sincerely appreciate the Christian Science practitioners who

metaphysically support Wide Horizon bi-weekly.

In addition, although Wide Horizon did apply for and receive an SBA loan under the Payroll Protection Program as part of the Care Act, we have also gratefully received funding from our donors to help sustain operations during this time.

Thank you for your ongoing metaphysical and financial support of Wide Horizon and Christian Science nursing.





Board's perspective this has been a very challenging year," he reported. "Wide has operated this year at about half capacity for nearly 12 months, and the global pandemic certainly has been a far greater challenge. The good news is that your donations have more than offset the losses from operations. Complying with the strict state requirements related to the pandemic has put an extra strain on everyone, Christian Science nurses and staff, but especially on Wide Horizon's Director of Christian Science Nursing and Executive Director. We are so grateful for their continual excellent management during this trying time. But, in spite of this year's unusual challenges, there has been progress in other ways. This includes updating Wide's employee retirement plan to conform to new IRS regulations and reconstituting the Investment Committee, while continuing with the expertise provided by financial advisor, Linda Leitz, of Peace of Mind Financial Planning."

David then emphasized, "We especially acknowledge and thank our wonderful dedicated Christian Science nursing staff. We're also sincerely grateful for the conscientious work done by other support staff, which includes activities, food service, housekeeping, maintenance, and administration."

"We also appreciate each of you who so lovingly support the activities of Wide Horizon," he wholeheartedly concluded. "We value your prayers, your volunteer service, and your special support of individual guests. Of course, without the financial support that you so generously give, it would be even more challenging to sustain Wide Horizon now and for the future. We are grateful for the many ways you can and do support the healing ministry and mission of Wide Horizon. Thank you!"



Let's be grateful! -Treasurer's Report

oug Izmirian began his report, "Gratitude is the first thought that came to me when preparing to write this report. At Wide Horizon, we have so much for which to be grateful. We are grateful for the dedicated Christian Science nurses who provide the healing care that is the primary mission of the organization. We are grateful for all of the other staff members who support their work. We are grateful for all of the volunteers, practitioners, churches, foundations, members of Wide Horizon, and other donors, who contribute their metaphysical support and financial resources, that are the means for fulfilling this vital mission."

"This year," he continued, "I must also add a special thanks to my predecessor as Treasurer, Lydia Roberts, who had served for several years in this capacity. She and our Chairman, David Shawaker, are each finishing their ninth year of service as Directors. Their sincerity, thoughtfulness, wisdom, and love for their fellow man, has been evident to all of us who have worked with them on the Board of Directors, and their dedication to Wide Horizon serves as an ongoing source of inspiration."

"To say that the past year has been an eventful one seems like a major understatement," he exclaimed. "Yet with respect to the financial status of Wide Horizon, I am pleased to report that divine Love has continued to meet all of our needs."

Doug then reported, "In the *Church Manual* of The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts (page 76), Mrs. Eddy provides that the Board of Directors 'report at the annual Church meeting the amount of funds which the Church has on hand, the amount of indebtedness and of its expenditures for the year.' This provision will guide our report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2020."

"A key metric that we monitor is financial liquidity," he continued. "This includes checking and savings accounts, as well as investments. For the past fiscal year, our total funds on hand increased by 37%. Turning to our annual expenditures and operating activity, we have seen increases in Net Assets for both fiscal years 2019 and 2020. Total Long-Term Liabilities at the end of this past fiscal year were \$373,000, and \$331,000 of this amount (89%) consisted of a Paycheck Protection Program Loan from Vectra Bank. Since all of these funds were used for payroll expenses, this note qualifies for forgiveness under the terms of the CARES Act passed by Congress earlier this year."

In closing, Doug warmly said, "I will briefly return to the opening topic of gratitude. I am grateful each and every day for the blessings that Wide Horizon is bringing to our community, and to all of you who make these blessings possible. Thank you."

form Williams, Director of Development & Outreach, started with, "I'd like to share my thoughts about fundraising and building relationships with donors. When I started a career in sales many years ago – where I worked partially for commissions for a living - among my first lessons was about the need to be clear that commissions are symbols of divine Love's infinite care and not my means to welfare, happiness, and fulfillment. Of course, I had to be grateful for divine Love's supply. For, as we know, 'Our gratitude is riches.' (Christian Science Hymnal, 249) Yet the emphasis had to be on appreciating God's spiritual provision first, rather than merely on material means."

"So instead of experiencing the ups and downs of sales commissions based on a good or bad performance or of money coming and going," Norm emphasized, "I realized that my welfare and stability were dependent on Spirit – on God's continual goodness. In that way, my substance was changeless and permanent rather than vulnerable to variable market conditions and customer desires. I think this approach reflects what Mrs. Eddy writes, 'Substance is that which is eternal and incapable of discord and decay.'" (Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures, p. 468)

He added, "I had to learn that the substance of my work was first helping meet customer needs rather than earning a dollar: for if the dollar was first and then the customer needs, my welfare would have been subject to the possible "discord" of market conditions. Instead, I could experience the constancy of Spirit, God meeting needs at all times and in all circumstances."

Pausing, Norm continued, "Those lessons stood me in good stead when I entered the world of fundraising where success is often measured by what money is coming in the door. Instead of taking that view, I chose to see Wide Horizon's substance as a reflection of divine Love's care for man as manifested in Christian Science nursing and that we are servants of divine Mind, Almighty God, and not the so-called mighty dollar. So, I see our relationship with donors as one of partnership in helping meet the needs of those who are cared for at Wide Horizon. We therefore are seeking donor commitment to the ideals and place of Wide Horizon, which also includes engagement through prayer, attending events, and volunteering."

Then he reported, "This year we are grateful to donors who have helped to meet the human need at Wide. Contributions help Wide Horizon pay our dedicated Christian Science nurses, who give approximately 30,000 hours of care to guests, and our other essential staff members. Contributions have included approximately \$300,000 from individual donors like you, \$40,000 from churches, \$190,000 from foundations, and \$1.8 million from estates. This supply helped us cover the significant deficit of operational revenues to expenses. While donations

were exceptionally good last year (due in large part to estate gifts), there is still a great need to fill due to the shortfall in revenues from operations this year. Our in goal in 20/21 is to reach \$1.25 million in giving to cover this gap. Furthermore, while raising the funds to meet this year's need, we also will be planting seeds for covering future needs through planned giving. In any given year, up to 50% of our budget comes from planned gifts such as bequests, stock, IRA rollovers, annuities, and life insurance plans. We will reach out to you through emails and printed materials to provide information on how to include Wide in your planned giving. Our goal in 20/21 is to raise \$650,000 in planned gifts, which is just over 50% of our budget. To help us attain our objective, there will be one large bequest coming to us during this fiscal year."

"We will keep you informed about how Wide Horizon is doing throughout the pandemic," Norm added, "with occasional updates by email or phone call. Also, due to the pandemic, we are prevented from holding events here at Wide, so we are considering some new events held through Zoom. And, soon we will launch the end of the year campaign with a matching opportunity and a goal of \$150,000.

All that being said, our top goal this year is actually to see the abundance, continuity, eternality, and harmony of our substance, which comes from Spirit, God. In this, we invite you to join us to pray about several challenges to Wide Horizon's substance: 1) Greater receptivity to the care Christian Science provides through Christian Science nursing; 2) The belief that the pandemic will disrupt our fundraising efforts and limit supply."

He warmly concluded, "Thank you for all your prayers and for all you are doing to care for and support Wide Horizon!"

ue Wood, Director of Christian Science Nursing, started her comments on Zoom, "This is quite a different way to greet you, but we hope you will all feel our affection for you none-the-less! Thinking about what we have accomplished this year, or how the year has gone—well, every year is different--but this year has been really different, I think we would all agree. Who could have predicted, at the beginning of the year, that in the course of a few short months we would be wearing masks while working, taking our temperature when we arrive at work, or maintaining space of social distancing? For the most part, we have adapted to these inconveniences without letting them become a distraction. We know where our safety comes from, and the safety of our guests. True safety is from the spiritual facts that Christian Science explains and demonstrates from the ever-present law of God."

Then she added, "The Colorado Department of Health has quite a lengthy list of regulations that facilities like Wide Horizon are required to follow. So, we had to work through all that, and come up with a plan of compliance that satisfied the Health Department and was workable for our employees and patients/ guests. We are grateful that we have been able to shield our patients from most of the regulations, as long as the staff is in full compliance. And, we are grateful that we passed a surprise State inspection for infectious disease control in the spring!

As the rules have loosened up a bit, we have been able to have family visits--outside—with the visitors wearing masks and maintaining a proper distance. We have been able to resume limited use of our dining room—with each person sitting at their own table, and all the tables spaced about 10 feet apart. We have been very careful about new admissions, and have only brought in a few new patients, in the last couple months, when there was a clear indication that the individual was completely free of the coronavirus. And gratefully, no one at Wide Horizon has been affected by the virus throughout this ordeal."

Sue continued, "Our other major challenge this year has been the departures of Christian Science nurses due to retirement or relocation. Since January this year, six experienced Christian Science nurses have left Wide Horizon. This number is significant for a nursing staff of about 20 individuals. So, thankfully, we were also able to hire four individuals over the course of the year – each was new to Christian Science nursing. The four are all progressing nicely through the training program, and they have become valuable, well-

respected and well-loved members of our team. Good news also includes a Christian Science nurse who joined our staff in June 2018, after working at another Christian Science facility during her school breaks from Principia College. She moved through the second half of our training program and earned her listing in *The Christian Science Journal* this July."

Then Sue reflected, "Recently when I thought about these amazing people and the work they are doing for our Cause, several snippets of quotations from *Science and Health* and the Bible came to me:

- 'The way to extract error from mortal mind is to pour in truth through flood-tides of Love.' (S&H, p. 201)
- '...there is nothing too hard for [God].' (Jerimiah 32:17)
- 'The tender word and Christian encouragement of an invalid, pitiful patience with his fears and the removal of them....' (S&H, p. 367) [Editor's note: the marginal note is "Genuine healing."]

For they do each express that *tenderness*, that *pitiful patience*, and the strength that keeps moving forward no matter the picture to be addressed."

Furthermore, Sue shared, "The patients/guests here are pretty remarkable in their expression of God's qualities, as well. The diligence, tenacity, insight, clarity, strength, joy, gratitude, faithfulness they express is way beyond any *human* capacity to stay strong or hopeful. One of the patients gave a



testimony at Wide Horizon's 'Thursday' evening testimony meeting saying how wonderful it is to wake up with such a feeling of joy every morning. She testified to two recent healings—both of which she prayed about with a Christian Science practitioner for several months. The first was a healing of a sore on her back on the side she sleeps on all the time. The other was a healing of hearing loss, which, though it took a while to work through, was a full return of her hearing. It was sudden and complete reversal of the problem!

Another patient had a fall from her commode in the middle of the night. The Christian Science nurse heard something unusual and went to check. She found the patient crying on the floor because she had fallen forward onto her face and gotten one leg tangled in a commode chair. Although calm, the Christian Science nurses on duty were pretty concerned about this patient. After carefully placing her on the bed, they called the Christian Science Practitioner. Also, they reported in a log to the next shift that there was a lot of bruising on the patient's face. At the time of the 7:00 a.m. shift change and patient check, the new Christian Science nurse on duty went in expecting to find the patient in her bed. Instead, this patient had walked into the bathroom on her own and was getting ready for her day. And, there was no evidence of bruising on her face or leg, and no limping. There was no evidence she had ever had a fall."

Sue confidently concluded, "This is what a lifetime of prayer and study of Christian Science does for people! Thank you for supporting Christian Science nursing at Wide Horizon!"

Brian Boettiger, Executive Director of Wide Horizon, started, "I'll begin with this from Psalms, 'Let us exalt

(Ps. 34:3) In exalting His name together, perhaps each of you has grown spiritually in new ways – feeling hope in greater good, learning to trust God more, seeing the light of Christ shining in daily life, practicing a higher degree of Christian love and understanding, and staying in good health during these past months."

Then he asked, "Hasn't 2020 thrown a number of wild pitches toward us all?" He continued, "Since March, Wide Horizon has continued to have nearly all hands-on deck to weather the seeming storms - the ebb and flow of mortal mind due to COVID-19 and other erroneous influences of human thought. We've striven to keep our vision clear, keeping the ship 'Wide Horizon' afloat - avoiding surges, shoals, sand bars, or the shallows. We've also used some patchwork to meet payrolls and staffing during these months. We've done our best to keep the high goal of Truth before thought, keeping calm and trusting God. The Gospels record that in stormy conditions, Christ Jesus stated, 'Peace, be still' and the storm ceased immediately. Now that's power! And ahoy, we've also done a lot of casting the proverbial net on the right side of the ship, finding a full catch of fish in daily good works! We have turned so-called limitations into opportunities to grow stronger, and shall I say, smarter! One example is the multiple Zoom meetings – whether for accreditation inspections, board meetings, connecting with colleagues, working with other professionals, or our meeting together today!"

"For many years it has been such a privilege to work at Wide Horizon," he stated, "side by side with the many spiritually minded individuals who support this organization. Every day we see greater teamwork, kindness, creativity, and resilience expressed on our campus. We feel the gratitude and support from our Field. Our hearts have been warmly touched by the donations and loving notes sent to us. More recently, we are grateful for being able to selectively admit guests and allow family visitation to patients – still in compliance with guidelines and regulations as a State-licensed nursing care facility."

"Christian Science nurses so ably handle all types of practical needs with such loving care," Brian emphasized. "Their focused metaphysical approach in seeing God's man - made in Spirit's image and likeness - makes all the difference. They express genuine tenderness in their work, which is infused with Love. Such expression of Spirit, Love, is evident among all Wide Horizon's employees. Our guests and patients feel this holy, supportive atmosphere of peace, quietude and love. This is conducive to progress, restoration and healing. Our maintenance staff tenderly cares for the grounds and buildings – professionally completing many small projects throughout the year. Our housekeeping staff lovingly cleans and maintains order in all of the living spaces. (Alexander Pope once penned, 'Order is heaven's first law.') And, food service staff thoughtfully prepares delicious high-quality meals which are lovingly served. This caring nature consistently shows the loving care our support staff feel for their work and our guests."

He continued, "Recently, a couple of much needed capital improvements were made. The inoperable, unsafe 30-year old 'dumbwaiter' or service elevator was replaced. And, the 30-year old commercial air conditioning unit for the main building has been

replaced with a new energy efficient unit. Gratefully, these projects were lovingly funded by a generous foundation. We are blessed!"

He added, "This year, Wide Horizon's senior management team has continued to listen and be led by our highest sense of right when making the difficult decisions that affect (and are so foreign) to our work. These include reading and abiding by pertinent government agency materials, restricting admissions and visitations, staff wearing face masks while working and taking temperatures daily, and so on. And, we wash our hands so often (mine have turned a shade lighter) beloved moms would be proud. So, as stated, Wide Horizon continues to be in compliance to the many guidelines and restrictions required at a nursing facility. But, please note, none of these requirements is consent to error. Although there appears to be concessions made to material methods, I have thought and stated aloud a number of times, 'Suffer it to be so now!'

In fact, our Leader in Christian Science, Mary Baker Eddy, wrote of our Master: 'Jesus' concessions... to material methods were for the advancement of spiritual good.' It is my heartfelt hope that the countless prayers and loving actions in regard to material methods during the past months will advance mankind more in the demonstration of spiritual good."

He continued, "So, when shelter-in-place or be safer-at-home was implemented, we knew everyone's true shelter is under the Almighty's wing. While we wash our hands a lot, we can also purify our thoughts of anything which is not good, is not of God. While we may be keeping our physical distance, we know that nothing can separate us from the love of God. And, while we're more at our homes, we're still being quiet and still, waiting on God in holy obedience. Page 6
